

This street dedication is thanks to ten years of hard work and dedication of the San Bernardino Police Historical Society.



Code Compliance Ups it Staffing and Hours

With the City Council recently increasing the number of Code Compliance officers from eight to twenty, changes are coming to the department.

Even as Code Compliance staffing continues to ramp up, two new weekend and after hours enforcement shifts were launched on June 17. Code Officers are now also working shifts on Fridays from 11 am – 9 pm and Saturdays from 12 pm – 10 pm.

Additional after-hours shifts are anticipated to begin in mid-August on Wednesdays through Saturdays from 12 pm – 10 pm.

 Always use fireworks ("Safe and Sane" only) with an adult present.

- Always read and follow label directions
- Always have water (garden hose/bucket) and a fire extinguisher within reach
- Never alter fireworks
- Always place fireworks on a firm, noncombustible surface, like a driveway.
- Never re-light "dud" fireworks
- Never point, throw or mishandle fireworks

What Fireworks are Illegal in San Bernardino?

The purpose of making certain fireworks illegal in San Bernardino is not to take away your fun. Certain fireworks are more likely to cause fires to property or hillsides, as well as cause injuries to individuals setting them off or watching. Just last year, an 8 year old San Bernardino child was tragically killed on July 4 when he was struck by an illegal aerial firework,

Illegal fireworks include any firework that flies through the air, moves across the ground or explodes. This includes, firecrackers, skyrockets, roman candles, and torpedoes or explosive items, such as M-80 or M-100.

Due to fire dangers, ALL firework usage is prohibited north of the 210 Freeway and 30th Street. In addition, firework usage is prohibited in public parks or on public streets and no one under 18 may buy or possess fireworks.

The City asks that those interested in using fireworks on July 4 to purchase legal "safe and sane" fireworks at one of the 32 permitted fireworks stands open between July 1 and July 4 throughout the city.

In the meantime, San Bernardino Police have taken a zero tolerance stand against illegal fireworks. San Bernardino Police and SB County Fire will be working in tandem to enforce San Bernardino Fireworks laws. A first violation will result in a fine of \$1,000. A second violation will result in a fine of \$2,500 and a third violation will result in a fine of \$3,000.

Residents are encouraged to report fireworks being ignited by calling SBPD's 24 hour non-emergency line at: (909) 383-5311. There is a \$250 reward for reporting illegal fireworks that lead to a conviction in San Bernardino.







In the first two weeks of June, SBPD have already made arrests and seized over 1,000 pounds of illegal fireworks.

Fireworks Can Be Very Scary for Your Pets

Here are some tips to keep your furry friends calm and safe

Many people enjoy the booming sounds and flashing colors of fireworks, but they can be terrifying, overwhelming and dangerous for our pets.

On the Fourth of July, many animals become so frightened by the noise and commotion of fireworks that they run from otherwise familiar environments and people, and sadly become lost. They may also suffer devastating health effects from the stress. The sudden bright flashes and sounds can cause animals to run into roadways, resulting in more car accidents than normal.

Here are a few simple ways to keep your pets safe during the Fourth of July festivities:

Keep your pet safely away from fireworks.

Pets are very sensitive to loud noises, flashing lights and strong smells. On the Fourth of July, and other days people are likely to set off fireworks, it's best to leave your pets safely indoors, preferably with a radio or TV



turned on to soften jarring noises. If you're unable to leave your pet inside at home, keep them leashed and under your direct control at all times.

Safeguard your pet with a microchipped ID.

All pets, even those kept indoors full-time, should always wear collars with ID tags. Indoor-only pets can become so frightened during fireworks displays that they may take desperate measures to escape the noise, including breaking through windows or door screens. You should also ensure that your pet is microchipped and that the chip is properly registered with your current contact information.

If your pet becomes lost.

If your pet does become lost, contact the San Bernardino Animal Shelter (at (909) 384-7272) and surrounding shelters immediately. Last year, the San Bernardino Animal Shelter was able to successfully reunite 463 dogs and 14 cats to their families.

If you find a lost pet.

If you find a lost pet, either take them to the address on their tag or bring them to a local animal shelter so they can be reunited with their family.

Renovations to San Bernardino's Historic Roosevelt Bowl are underway, but the great music and fun times couldn't wait!

The Sizzlin' Summer Nights is a free Concert Series at the Roosevelt Bowl that will run every



Thursday from June 23 through July 28. Gates open at 5:00 pm with the show starting at 7:00.

Each week, a different band will take the stage. On June 23 - Midnight Ride, June 30 - Stone Soul, July 7 - Mariachi Arcoiris, July 14 - Bruno and the Hooligans, July 21 - Neon Nation, and July 28 - Suave the Band.

Nestled against the hill at Perris Hill Park, the Roosevelt Bowl is an 1,800-seat outdoor amphitheater in a historic and natural setting. The bowl was built and dedicated in 1934 as part of the Federal Work Progress Administration and is surrounded by stately oaks, which provide shade for the open-air seating.



Major Road Projects Moving Forward Across the City

Three major road projects: the Mt Vernon Bridge, 2nd Street Bridge and State Street connection have been under construction or in the planning process for some time. Here is an update as to where these projects currently stand.

2nd Street Bridge

Crews continue to make progress to replace the 2nd Street Bridge over Warm Creek between Arrowhead Avenue and Sierra Way.

This project consists of replacing the existing bridge, replacing 4 lanes of traffic, installation of a drainage system, and slope stabilization.

The project is expected to be completed and the bridge will be back open for traffic in August.

Mt Vernon Bridge

The Mt Vernon Bridge replacement project is a partnership between the City, Cal Trans, and SBCTA. While it may look like not much is happening, there is a lot going on under the bridge and nearby.

Currently, BNSF railroad is constructing bypass lines for trains to avoid the bridge construction. This stage must be completed before additional work can be done on the bridge itself.

SBCTA reports that this project remains on schedule, and the project completion is scheduled for 2024.

State Street Connection

On Thursday, June 23rd, sealed bids will be opened for the State Street construction contract which connects a gap on State Street between Baseline and Hanford Street.

Next Community Dump Day Set for Saturday June 25 at Perris Hill Park

Even with summer around the corner, it's not too late to do some spring cleaning. The next monthly Community Dump Day will take place on Saturday, June 25 from 8:00 am to 11:00 am at Perris Hill Park, located at 1135 E. Highland Avenue. San Bernardino residents can discard bulky items, tires, e-waste and metal. Construction and Hazardous materials will not be accepted, and proof of residency with either ID or a utility bill must be shown.

The June 25th Dump Day will also include free mulch giveaway and document shredding.

Dump days occur the last Saturday of every month at a selected location. See the chart below for the remaining 2022 schedule of dates and locations.




